





<u>The rainbow flag</u>: bright, bold and beautiful by Michelle Millar Fisher It's 1978 in San Francisco, and the city is filled with music and art and protests for social justice – and the Gay Freedom Day Parade needs a new symbol. Harvey Milk and Gilbert Baker come up with the idea for a flag. Making it a rainbow, Gilbert decides, will be the perfect way to express love, togetherness, and pride. Gilbert and his good friends make it happen. They unfurl the flag at the parade to the delight of the crowd. Today the Rainbow Flag is a familiar sight, at the Pride Parade and around the world.

Rainbow: a first book of pride by Michael Genhart, PhD (2019) In this book of love, hope, diversity, and acceptance, each stripe of the rainbow flag gets a full double-page spread describing what its colour symbolizes within the context of LGBTQ+ pride. Red means life is presented along with an interracial gay couple holding their newborn baby in the hospital. The other colours standing for healing, sunlight, nature, harmony, and spirit likewise show happy scenes that depict children being supported by their same-sex parents in sweet moments from everyday life. A spread near the end shows a series of smiling, racially diverse families posing in front of global landmarks, waving rainbow flags to say, This is who I am, and I stand proud!

<u>Understanding sexuality:</u> what it means to be lesbian, gay or bisexual by Honor Head

This book looks at the issues around sexuality - what it means, being lesbian, gay or bisexual, coming out, homophobia and accepting yourself and being happy in your own skin. It includes talking and debating points and is perfect for someone starting to question their sexuality. It explores issues including sexuality, gender, self-esteem, prejudice, and discrimination and promotes and encourages discussion. By thinking creatively and critically, children can learn to accept their differences, embrace diversity, and improve their sense of self and how they fit into the bigger picture.

Understanding transgender by Honor Hea

A sensitive book that explores the issue of people who feel they do belong to the gender they were born with. It looks at what this means for the person and their family, issues around school policy, bullying and discrimination and explores the journey of transitioning.





<u>A house for everyone:</u> a story to help children learn about gender identity and gender expression by Jo Hirst (2018)

At lunchtime, all of Tom's friends gather at school to work together building their house. Each one of them has a special job to do, and each one of them has a different way of expressing their gender identity. Jackson is a boy who likes to wear dresses. Ivy is a girl who likes her hair cut really short. Alex doesn't feel like 'just' a boy, or 'just' a girl. They are all the same, they are all different – but they are all friends.

From Prejudice to Pride: a history of the LGBTQ+ movement by Amy Lamé (2017)

Follow LGBTQ+ history from ancient civilisations to the present-day and learn about key events including the trial of Oscar Wilde, the Stonewall riots, the AIDS crisis, same-sex marriage and changing laws that have impacted on LGBTQ+ life. Gain insight into the shifting attitudes that have challenged lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people and the experiences that help us understand what it means to be LGBTQ+ today.

Identity & gender by Charlie Ogden (2020)

After covering the concept of identity in broad terms, Identity and Gender offers a lucid, pointed explanation of the gender spectrum, gender identity, and the difference between sex and gender. A repeated exhortation to respect everyone's gender identity drives the points home.

Who are you? The kid's guide to gender identity by Brook Pessin-Whedbee (2017)

It presents clear and direct language for understanding and talking about how we experience gender: our bodies, our expression, and our identity. An interactive three-layered wheel included in the book is a simple, yet powerful, tool to clearly demonstrate the difference between our body, how we express ourselves through our clothes and hobbies, and our gender identity.


Guide for adults further explains the key concepts and identifies useful discussion points.

Sewing the rainbow: the story of Gilbert Baker and the Rainbow Flag

by Gayle E Pitman & pictures by Holly Clifton-Brown (2018) Gilbert Baker always knew he wanted a life full of colour and sparkle. In his small, gray, flat Kansas hometown, he helped his grandma sew and created his own art whenever he could. It wasn't easy; life tried over and over again to make Gilbert conform. But his sparkle always shone through. He dreamed of someday going somewhere as vibrant and colourful as he was.

This book shows that when you see a rainbow flag, you'll know it's okay to be your colourful self. Includes a 'Note to Parents and Caregivers' with more about Gilbert and the flag's history.

Pride: the story of Harvey Milk and the rainbow flag by Rob Sanders Harvey Milk had a dream. He wanted all people to be treated equally under the law; to love who they loved, be free to be themselves, and not be discriminated against. In 1977, Harvey became one of the first openly gay elected officials. The next year, he and his friend Gilbert Baker came up with a symbol to unite their community and the people who supported it, and to show pride. They created the first rainbow Pride Flag and introduced it at a march for equal rights.


Queer heroes: meet 53 LGBTQ heroes from past and present! by Arabelle Sicardi (2019)

Gay people who changed history by Adam Sutherland. (2015) Looks at gay people who have made a difference whether they are rulers and leaders in their field or ordinary people whose actions and example changed the lives of others. Biographies of each individual detail their struggles and achievements and look at the legacy each created.

It feels good to be yourself: a book about gender identity by Theresa Thorn (2019)

Some people are boys. Some people are girls. Some people are both, neither, or somewhere in between.

Colourful illustrations and simple language explain the basics of gender identity, cis, trans, and nonbinary genders. Language is power. This book gives children that power.

Ethnically inclusive; all abilities: wheelchair, glasses The GayBCs by M.L. Webb. (2019)

A playdate extravaganza transforms into a celebration of friendship, love, and identity as four friends sashay out of all the closets, dress up in a wardrobe fit for kings and queens, and discover the wonder of imagination. A glossary in the back offers opportunity for further discussion of terms and identities.

My own way: celebrating gender freedom for kids

by Joana Estrela adapted by Jay Hulme Reminiscent of Todd Parr, this gender-affirming picture book features childlike illustrations with people with a wide range of head and facial hair, clothing, and skin tones, from white and brown to pink and blue to purple and orange. "Girl or boy? / What brings you joy? / Pink or blue? / It's up to you." For young readers questioning their gender, including what colors to wear, how to style their hair, and what activities to play, the simple, rhyming, and reaffirming text emphasizes "You'll find your way!" Without using the term nonbinary, the text shifts to recognize that boy and girl may not describe everyone accurately; people can be both or none. A scene with identical bathrooms, except for gendered signs, reinforces this individual expression. For budding allies who may want to attach gender to people based on physical traits and activities, the text gently recommends that they let individuals tell their own stories and offers the best advice, "Just be as kind as you can." However children identify, this book offers support and acceptance.

Gay or Lesbian

<u>A day in the life of Marlon Bundo</u> by Marlon Bundo – rabbit, with Jill Twiss

The story of a lonely bunny, Marlon Bundo, who lives with his Grampa, Mike Pence, the Vice President of the United States. On a particular day, he meets another boy bunny, named Wesley, that changed his life forever.

Love is love by Michael Genhart, PhD

A boy becomes upset when he is teased for having two dads. After viewing his friend's family (with a mum and a dad) as not all that different from his own, he realises the best way to counter the ridicule is to be proud of who his fathers are and know that it is love that makes a family.

Maiden & princess by Daniel Haack & Isabel Galupo

A warrior maiden begrudgingly attends the matchmaker ball at the request of her friend, the Prince. Everyone considers her his perfect match until she surprises them by finding true love with someone else – with his sister, the Princess.

The best man by Richard Peck

Archer has four important role models in his life—his dad, his grandfather, his uncle Paul, and his favourite teacher, Mr. McLeod. When Uncle Paul and Mr. McLeod get married, Archer's sixth-grade year becomes one he'll never forget.

Love around the world by Fleur Pierets

Inspired by a true story, Love Around the World is the beautiful and heart-warming adventure of two women's journey to marry each other in every country where same-sex marriage is legal

A plan for Pops by Heather Smith

Lou visits his two grandfathers--Grandad, who is interested in technology, and Pops, who loves rock and roll--every Saturday, but things change when Pops falls and will have to use a wheelchair, so Lou comes up with an idea to help Pops adjust.

This bedtime story about bedtime stories shows how a lively, curious boy helps one of his moms create a magical tale. I promise by Catherine Hernandez,

A story about how queer families start with the promise to love a child. It captures parenting in diverse families in all their messy glory – from dealing with a kid who doesn't want to brush their teeth to looking under the bed for monsters to cuddling after a long day. It showcases the many shapes, sizes, and colours that families come in.

My two dads and me by Michael Joosten

An adorable board book for the babies and toddlers of gay fathers, featuring a variety of diverse loving families with two dads.

My two moms and me by Michael Joosten

Families with same-sex parents are celebrated in this board book that follows busy moms and their kids throughout their day--eating breakfast, going on a playdate, heading to the pool for a swim, and settling back in at night with a bedtime story and a good-night lullaby. <u>Wrestle!</u> By Charlotte Mars, Maya Newell & Gus Skattebol-james I love wrestling. When I grow up, I want to be just like my wrestling heroes: big and tough, with huge muscles. The only problem is my mums don't like fighting... A funny story about identity, family and dressing up, inspired by the award-winning documentary, Gayby Baby

<u>Plenty of hugs</u> by Fran Manushkin & pictures by Kate Alizadeh This cheerful book follows a family from morning to night. The toddler and mommies take a morning bike ride to a farm stand, they visit a zoo in the afternoon, and in the evening there's the bath and storybook routine before the child is tucked cosily into bed.







Bailey longs to wear the beautiful dresses of her dreams but is ridiculed by her unsympathetic family which rejects her true perception of herself.

<u>Phoenix goes to school:</u> story to support transgender and gender variant children by Phoenix and Michelle Finch

With encouragement from her mother, teacher, and a fellow student, Phoenix, who was assigned male at birth but identifies as female, finds the courage to face the first day of school.

Red: a crayon's story by Michael Hall

Red's factory-applied label clearly says that he is red, but despite the best efforts of his teacher, fellow crayons and art supplies, and family members, he cannot seem to do anything right until a new friend offers a fresh perspective.

I am Jazz by Jessica Herthel & Jazz Jennings

From the time she was two years old, Jazz knew that she had a girl's brain in a boy's body. She loved pink and dressing up as a mermaid and didn't feel like herself in boys' clothing. This confused her family, until they took her to a doctor who said that Jazz was transgender and that she was born this way.

The gender fairy by Jo Hirst

Only you know whether you are a boy or a girl. No one can tell you. It is a tale of two children who are taking their first joyful steps toward living as their true selves. It is an educational resource for all children and adults to understand what it might feel like to be a transgender child.

It includes notes for parents and teachers.

Jacob's room to choose by Ian and Sarah Hoffman

After kindergarteners Jacob and Sophie are prevented from using their school's bathrooms, their teacher helps her students write new rules about who can use which bathroom.

When Aidan Became a Brother by Kyle Lukoff

explores what it's like for Aidan when his parents expect a new baby. He wants to ensure everything will be just right for his younger sibling. Aidan knows that sometimes grown-ups can make mistakes, like when his parents thought he was a girl when he was born. As Aidan prepares 4-8yrs

for his role as big brother, he realizes that mistakes can be fixed with open communication. He knows the most important thing about being a big brother is how to love with his whole self.

<u>I'm not a girl</u> by Maddox Lyons and Jessica Verdi, illustrations by Dana Simpson



<u>The name I call myself</u> by Hasan Namir & pictures by Cathryn John (2020)



From age six to adolescence, we see Ari grow up before our eyes: As a child, they [refer dolls and princess movies, and want to grow out their hair, though their father insists on cutting it short because that's "what a boy looks like." At ten, they play hockey but wish they could try on their mother's dresses. At eighteen, they tell their parents the name in their heart and can finally be themselves.
